
Continuing their theme of creative and hands-on science, Year 3 made skeleton puppets to investigate the function of bones and joints.

Year 6 took a trip up to London this term to attend a special enactment of a court case at the Royal Courts of Justice. They also spent an afternoon going on a bug hunt.










Whole School Recent Events

'Bethlehem – the Musical", the Year 4 production, promised and delivered the traditional nativity play, although from a slightly different perspective. On the afternoon of Wednesday 5th December my wife and I joined Year 5, and a full house of parents and relatives, to be treated to the first public performance of this innovative play.

The unusual twist on the traditional Christmas story was to tell it from the point of view of the residents of Bethlehem, subsequent to a decree to carry out a census by Caesar, to appease his daughter. We were then transported to Bethlehem, where the reactions of the local populace and all of those required by the decree to register there, were recorded. The full range of human reactions were shown, with some of the local population exhibiting generosity and willingness to show their town to the best advantage but also some recognising commercial opportunities and how to take advantage of the visitors. The appearance of Mary and Joseph, their taking up residence in the stable, the arrival of the baby Jesus and the subsequent visits of townsfolk, shepherds and wise men were all faithfully recounted with the usual mixture of humour and song.





There were a huge number of songs, many of them requiring solo performances, all of which were delivered with gusto ensuring that throughout the hour long performance, the audience were held spellbound. There were too many stand-out performances to nominate any single person or group for specific mention, as everyone contributed with skill and enthusiasm. A production of this nature requires substantial input from parents, relatives and particularly, the teachers, Mrs Searle and Messrs

Hall and Stacey, with considerable support from the rest of the staff and Sue Langwade, who wrote the musical together with Mark and Helen Johnson. I would like to express our

warmest thanks to everyone and, of course, to the children for a memorable performance, which again tells the Christmas story from a unique perspective.

All school teaching staff benefitted from a training morning on 'Understanding Autism' in November during our INSET day. The training was run by specialist teachers from Surrey County Council and we covered various areas including the background of Autism, gaining a diagnosis, difficulties faced by children and parents, strategies to help/support and a range of provision ideas for mainstream classrooms and interventions. Whilst many teaching staff have attended training in the past at Linden Bridge Specialist School, we found it useful to come together as a whole staff and be given an opportunity to learn, discuss and plan our whole school approach to supporting children with (or without) a diagnosis of Autism.
